



Iowa Recovery Update - Aug. 13, 2024

State and FEMA disaster assistance is available for homeowners and renters affected by tornadoes, severe storms and flooding in **28 lowa counties**.

The counties are Adair, Adams, Buena Vista, Cedar, Cherokee, Clarke, Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, Harrison, Humboldt, Jasper, Lyon, Mills, Monona, Montgomery, O'Brien, Osceola, Palo Alto, Plymouth, Polk, Pottawattamie, Ringgold, Shelby, Sioux, Story, Union and Woodbury.

Key Messages

- FEMA has provided more than \$58 million in Individual Assistance directly to survivors to help with home repairs, paying for a temporary place to live and other serious needs not covered by insurance.
- More than 6,000 lowa households have been approved for Individual Assistance.
- In addition, FEMA's National Flood Insurance Program has paid more than \$6 million in claims for about 200 lowa policyholders.
- Ask FEMA for Rental Assistance by calling the FEMA Helpline at 800-621-3362 or visiting a Disaster Recovery Center.
- The State of Iowa has a temporary housing program. The state's <u>Disaster Recovery Temporary</u> <u>Housing Program (DRTHP)</u> is available in eligible counties. Residents can apply <u>online</u> or by calling 1-833-307-6030. The Call Center is open daily from 7 a.m. 8 p.m.
- Agriculture Recovery Center events are Aug. 22 in Woodbury County and Aug. 27 in O'Brien County.

For Homeowners:

Disaster Recovery Temporary Housing Program (DRTHP)

Governor Reynolds has announced a <u>Disaster Recovery Temporary Housing Program (DRTHP)</u> that will provide temporary sheltering options.

The <u>Disaster Recovery Temporary Housing Program (DRTHP)</u> is available through the state of lowa to provide temporary sheltering options for eligible disaster survivors as they pursue long-term housing solutions. For this program, housing options may include recreational vehicles and travel trailers, for up to six months at no cost for lowans whose homes were majorly damaged, destroyed, or deemed not habitable.

The household must have a primary residence located in one of the eligible counties. Please review this page for list of <u>eligible counties</u>.

Residents can apply online or by calling 1-833-307-6030. The Call Center is open daily from 7 a.m. – 8 p.m.

For Homeowners:

The <u>Disaster Recovery Housing Assistance Program</u> application is open now for disaster-impacted homeowners in counties approved for FEMA Individual Assistance. *A map of approved counties is available <u>here.</u>*



This state of Iowa-run program addresses unmet housing recovery needs outside the scope of insurance coverage or FEMA Individual Assistance. Eligible homeowners can receive up to \$50,000 for the repair or rehabilitation of their disaster-impacted homes. The program ID is 28.

Interested homeowners must first file an insurance claim if insurance is present, then apply for FEMA Individual Assistance, and received a Housing Assistance award and then; if there are unmet home repair needs can apply for the Disaster Recovery Housing Assistance Program.

For Developers:

The <u>State Disaster Recovery New Housing Grant Program</u> application is open now for developers. The program ID is 571222 It will provide financial assistance for the development of for sale and rental housing in cities impacted by the disasters in approved counties.

Applications for state grant programs are available on <u>lowaGrants.gov</u>. First-time users must create an account. A short instructional video can help applicants with the login process. A call center is also available for those who need additional assistance with their application.

Iowa Department of Education Emergency Grants

The Iowa Department of Education announced that five Iowa school districts located in disaster-impacted communities will receive a total of nearly \$300,000 in emergency grant funds to support students experiencing homelessness as a result of this summer's weather-related disasters.

FEMA Individual Assistance Call Center

Applicants with insurance may receive a call from FEMA Individual Assistance Call Center to assist them with completing their applications. Survivors may receive a phone call, text and email requesting additional insurance information.

Insurance information is the most common missing document. If homeowners cannot find the insurance policy or the insurance declaration, or the information was lost during the disaster, it can usually be located on the insurance company's website or by contacting the insurance agent.

FEMA may be able to help with damages not covered by insurance. Once an insurance settlement is reached FEMA may be able to help with the difference between the settlement and actual cost of repairs. Applicants should keep receipts. You may receive an automated phone call, text message or email offering additional resources available to you.

What is the Program?

RAYS is a scholarship program for eligible youth to help cover costs for a multitude of activities including but not limited to: sports registration, band, dance, and other recreational programs. The RAYS scholarship can provide up to \$100 per individual, and has a limit of \$200 per household.

Am I eligible?

To receive a RAYS scholarship the child must be under 18 and living in one of our service counties (Boone, Jasper, Marion, Polk and Warren). Your household income must be <u>at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level</u> to qualify for RAYS. Funding availability does vary.

Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)

What help is available?

We will be taking applications for the 2024–2025 Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) beginning October 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025. Those eligible to apply include households with elderly members age 60 or older, or have a family member who is disabled. Applications for all other income-eligible households will begin Friday, November 1, 2024.

Your household may be able to receive a one-time payment for your utility bill if you meet <u>income guidelines</u>. Assistance level depends on income level, family size, the type of fuel you use to heat your home and other factors. If you heat your home with liquid propane (LP), you can qualify to receive a delivery of propane through this program.

If you have received a disconnection notice or if you are disconnected from your power source, we may have funding to assist you. Please read below for more information on how to contact us and apply for assistance.

When can I apply?

Next time LIHEAP applications will be accepted is October 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025, annually.




